All stakeholders revive pledge to eliminate violence against women

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ISLAMABAD — '16 Days of Activism Against Gender Violence Campaign' kicked off Friday with colourful advocacy events by the nongovernmental organizations.

Nomad Art Gallery arranged a more artistic event 'Aman Shanakht Banao' (Make peace your identity) to visually enthuse the participants to voice against gender-based violence. The gallery partnered with the UN Women for this event.

Member National Assembly and Chairperson National Commission on Human Development (NCHD) Nafisa Shah was the chief guest along with Alice Shakleford, the Country Representative UN Women.

Speaking on the occasion, Nafisa Shah said, "Although the government has achieved a milestone by passing three pro-women bills in its threeand-a-half-year tenure, yet they continue to suffer and a radical change is required in the very mindset of society in this regard."

Nafisa Shah who was the chief guest on the occasion said it was high time everyone realised his responsibility and let women play their role in the progress and prosperity of society. She expressed the pleasure women were more aware of their rights than before.

"We have a woman speaker in the National Assembly with 77 members. Similarly, in the Senate we have 17 women senators which is a good sign of women's active participation in running the affairs of the country."

A mural was put on display to get the signatures of the visitors endorsing the cause. Nageen Hayat, Director Nomad said the mural titled 'Aman Shanakht Banao' is result of intensive discussion, workshops, and research on the violence against women in Pakistan.

The mural also included "The People Are Demanding' highlighting strong representation from all walks of life in form of comments and their demands from the government to make the society better and peaceful.

Nageen said the mural would open for comment and artwork from Nov 25 to Dec 10.

On display were the paintings by 22 artists. The work is the outcome of the

workshops on violence against women in which the artists took part.
